Pathway Overview

- Program offers students the opportunity to develop entry-level helping skills for assisting others in navigating the course of their lives.
- Students develop a foundation for understanding human needs through extensive coursework in psychology and sociology. Courses include Developmental Psychology, Interviewing Techniques, Stress Management, Social Problems, and Social Context of Aging.
- Graduates can expect to find work with a variety of populations, such as the developmentally challenged, children and youth, the aged, and the mentally ill.
- Additionally, students develop oral and written communication skills through courses in English composition, basic counseling and interviewing, keyboarding, and Internet navigation. Students also have the opportunity to study Spanish. With this curriculum, students are prepared to work to meet the needs of a wide variety of populations.
- Recent graduates have obtained positions in food stamps and benefits analysis with the Department of Social Services, as intake counselors and program assistants in day treatment and sheltered workshop settings, as facilitators with children and youth programs, in domestic violence services, and in programs for the aged.
