FAYETTEVILLE – The Cumberland-Fayetteville Opioid Response Team (C-FORT) is seeking input from the public for the 2019 Supportive Community Survey. The survey gives community members an opportunity to share with C-FORT how opioids and other substances affect lives and provides a snapshot of

community knowledge and awareness about opioids. Access the survey at www.surveymonkey.com/r/C-FORT. It should take 5 to 10 minutes to complete. The survey data will be used to support C-FORT strategies, action plans and activities for the upcoming year. The survey will be available through Dec. 31. Opioids are a class of drugs that include the illegal drug

heroin, synthetic opioids such as fentanyl and legally prescribed pain relievers like oxycodone, hydrocodone, codeine, morphine and many others. C-FORT is dedicated to improving the opioid response in the community through a collaborative effort among local government and community stakeholders. There are currently over 90 stakehold-

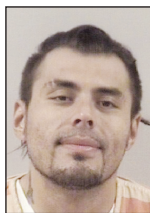

Dunn man linked to Smithfield break-in

Deputies have made an arrest in a three-week-old burglary case that landed a Dunn man in jail. Officers say a home

on the 2200 block of Barbour Road, just outside the Smithfield city limits, was forcibly entered on Oct. 15. Deputies say the thieves stole \$900 worth of items, including musical and stereo equipment. Days later, some of the stolen musical equipment was found at a Fayetteville pawn shop. An arrest came in the case after deputies conducted a search warrant near Four Oaks. Johnston County

deputies arrested Jose Federico Saucedo Jr., 31, of the 5600 block of Highway 242 South in Dunn on Nov. 6. Saucedo was charged with felony breaking and entering, felony larceny, felony possession of stolen property and misdemeanor probation violation. Saucedo was also served with two warrants for failing to appear in court on charges of misdemeanor possession of marijuana and unlawfully transporting or possessing copper. Saucedo was booked into the Johnston County Jail under a \$55,000 bond on the breaking and entering charges. He was given an additional \$750 bond on the failure to appear warrants. Detectives said they have recovered most of the property stolen in the break-in.

Homeowner watches thieves steal property

A homeowner was out-of-town Tuesday when his security camera sent him a notification that someone was at his residence. The victim watched on his cellphone as two suspects reportedly broke into a barn at his home on Smith Road, off Highway 210 west of Smithfield, and began loading up items into their vehicle. The victim contacted the Johnston County Sheriff's Office and deputies quickly responded to the scene catching both suspects before they could leave.

Officers said the men had loaded up \$1,750 in property including a backpack blower, handheld blower and a pressure washer but were caught before they could leave the scene. William Lester Denning, 41, of the 10000 block of Highway 301 South, Four Oaks, and Marvin Wayne Holt, 57, of the 100 block of Hugh Drive, Smithfield, were arrested. Holt complained of a

medical issue and was transported to the hospital for evaluation before being taken to jail. Both men were charged with felony breaking and entering, felony larceny, felony possession of stolen property and misdemeanor possession of stolen goods. Denning was being held on a \$65,000 bond. Holt's bail was set at \$60,000. The stolen property was returned to the owner.
